ASIAN AMERICAN EARLY IMMIGRATION

1790: The Naturalization Act Only an "alien, being a free white person," can apply for citizenship.

1882: The Chinese Exclusion Act Bans immigration from China.

1910: Angel Island Opens The major port of entry for Asian immigrants on the West coast.

1917: Asiatic Barred Zone Act Immigration exclusion expanded to all of Asia and the Pacific Islands.

1934: Tidings McDuffie Act As the Philippines transitions from a U.S. colony to an independent country, Filipino U.S. nationals lose their status.

1952: McCarran-Walter Act Abolishes the "alien ineligible to citizenship" category, which in practice only applied to people of Asian descent.

1965: Hart-Celler Act Abolishes national origin quotas and establishes a family reunification clause.

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
